Out and about with our governors

t was a jam-packed year for our governors as they all rolled up their sleeves to get stuck into their duties.

All governors are elected by the public and staff members and some governors are appointed by local organisations, such as Kent County Council, Age UK, the Kent Head Teacher Association and Kent universities. All these people give their time freely to make sure you get the very best service from your NHS.

In September, we held an event in Sevenoaks, called "Let's discuss diabetes", attended by more than 160 people. A number of services that help people to prevent and control diabetes, were on hand to give advice to help people to manage their diabetes effectively. The governors were there, alongside members of the public and representatives from other organisations.

Jo Naismith, governor in Sevenoaks at that time, gave a warm welcome to a range of speakers, including Geoff Whitington from Fixing Dad who had been diagnosed with diabetes and managed to reduce his symptoms, thanks to adopting a healthier lifestyle. This event was held in conjunction with our Annual Members' Meeting and Annual General Meeting and attracted a great deal of interest and produced some excellent feedback.

Governors met our foundation trust members and others to see how they felt about our services. They caught up with a cross section of staff who work hard to provide them. These are tough times financially so it's essential for governors to understand the challenges staff are experiencing and, just as importantly, appreciate the amazing achievements they have made in improving the lives of the people they care for.

Governors attended a number of community hospital visits and saw first-hand the way in which staff care deeply for their patients. Hospital environments were found to be very good. The wards, clinics and waiting areas were clean with clear signposting (although some adjustments have been made as a result of visits). Privacy and dignity of care is high up on our agenda. The care of patients with dementia was a large focus for the trust this year and the governors were impressed with this work.

Governors realise that recruitment and retention of staff is an ongoing challenge and all NHS staff are feeling some pressure due to staff shortages and increasing workloads. The ever increasing elderly population and a lack of increased funding to compensate are huge challenges for KCHFT staff. Once again though, the governors praise the dedication of staff who provide services so well, despite these challenges.

Sonja said: "The council and the governors themselves have benefited hugely from another year of experience. We are committed to ensuring your voice is heard and your interests are always the main consideration."
