Keep this with you. Make sure you take it with you to your appointments.








Why do you need this passport?

It tells you how to look after your catheter.

Your nurse will write in your passport.

Remember to take it if you go to hospital.



What is a catheter?

It is a tube that takes (drains) wee from your bladder into a bag.

This is attached to your leg.



Why do I have a catheter?

You have a catheter because your bladder is not able to empty properly.


There are lots of reasons why this will happen. A nurse will write in your passport why you have your catheter.




Looking after your catheter is very important to help stop infections.

 Wash your hands with soap and water before and after you touch it.











- Carefully wash and dry around your catheter every day.
- Empty the bag into a toilet when it is almost full or if you feel uncomfortable.
- Make sure the bag is fixed on your leg using the special straps.
- You can wear the catheter at the top or bottom of your leg. Speak to the nurse so you have the right length tube.
- Make sure the tube is not twisted or pulling.

You will need to change your catheter bag once a week. The nurse will show you how.

The nurse can also show you how to use a night bag for when you go to sleep.

What should my wee look like?

It should be light yellow.


1 to 3 is healthy.

4 to 8 and you need to drink more.





If you are worried about the colour or smell of your wee, speak to your doctor or nurse.




What to do if wee is not going into the bag...

- Try moving the bag down your leg.
- Check that the bag is not full.
- Speak to the doctor or nurse.



Can I still have sex if I have a catheter?

Yes you can. Ask your doctor or nurse for advice.



What to do with used catheter bags...

Put them in a plastic bag. These can go in your normal rubbish bin.



If you are worried about anything speak to your doctor or nurse.
